Established in 1995 as the George Parkyn National Centre for Gifted Education, the Centre supports gifted children, their families, teachers and schools through a variety of initiatives. The One Day School (ODS) programme operates in 8 regions (North and South Island), for children aged from 6 – 13, Gifted Online (GO) caters for children unable to attend ODS and the Small Poppies programme works with children from 2.5 – 6 years of age in Auckland, Wellington, Nelson and Christchurch. Professional development programmes are designed for schools, teacher training given at both pre-school and primary school level, and parent workshops are offered.

REACH Education specialises in providing professional development in gifted education. It offers the Certificate in Effective Practice in Gifted Education, a semester-length online course with a strong focus on first gaining insight into the world of the gifted child and then developing practical strategies relevant to the teacher's own situation. The course is open to teachers at every level of schooling.

REACH also offers a range of practical short workshops for teachers and parents which can tour to different parts of the country, organises events such as the 2009 Reaching Forward national conference and visits to this country by international experts in the field, and supports individual schools through mentoring, programme review, and similar activities.
